Making its debut appearance in Manchester during the ABO Conference, the Able Orchestra will feature an ensemble drawn from the Hallé and BBC Philharmonic together with other core artists and young people, including disabled musicians, from Nottinghamshire and Manchester. The performance will include a new piece specially commissioned from composer Oliver Vibrans.

Help Musicians has recently commissioned **Susanna Eastburn MBE** and **Jane Williams** to undertake a new research project entitled 'The Future of Classical Music Careers'. #### 14:00 2020 VISION: A SPORTING VISION FOR MUSIC

For our orchestras to thrive in 2030 and beyond, we must support and empower our musicians to meet the changing demands and challenges for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century orchestra. As we define our collective vision for what an orchestra could be, how can we develop the diversity of skills, attitudes, behaviours and resilience of our musicians (and management teams!) to consistently deliver high quality work? Enter elite-level athletes who perform in similarly high-pressure environments and work with sports psychologists as a fundamental part of their training and performance. Southbank Sinfonia has been working with Commonwealth Games gold medallist fencer, **Claire Bennett**, who distilled key concepts that drive elite level performance: developing a healthy growth-mindset, coping with failure and understanding intrinsic and extrinsic motivation - all concepts that can be transferred to musicians working at a similarly high level. For this session Claire will be joined by **Marcus Norman**, Artist Development Manager, Southbank Sinfonia along with **Erika Curbelo**, Southbank Sinfonia trumpet and **Jack Welch**, Southbank Sinfonia flute, who participated in the training, to reflect on what was learnt, interspersed with engaging practical activities led by Claire relating her experience to management and artists alike.

## 2020 VISION: HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE
