13:00 AFTERSHOCK: BUILDING A SUSTAINABLE CAREER

-14.00 This session focuses on launching the findings from the Future of Classical Music: building a sustainable career in classical music research project commissioned by Help Musicians. Conducted by Susanna Eastburn MBE and Jane Williams, the study brought together over 50 interviews from across the sector plus a wide-ranging literature review. The findings have been shaped into proposed outcomes and recommendations for key sector changes that will support and improve the sustainability of classical music careers over the next 10 years.

Hosted by Help Musicians, Susanna and Jane, and with contributions from Nadine Benjamin, Alasdair Tait and Professor Helena Gaunt, this session is the first opportunity for the sector to come together and discuss some of the key findings and how these might be put into action.

Key findings will be shared with participants in advance and part of the session will be interactive, attendees breaking into facilitated groups to think about current good practice, barriers and challenges and practical steps forward.

14:00 AFTERSHOCK: A HEALTHIER NATION

The pandemic has put a spotlight more than ever on the NHS and social care. Building on last year's conference session and the first comprehensive survey of UK orchestras' work in the health and social care sectors, we look at the implications for the 'social prescribing' agenda and the role orchestras can play to restore the health and wellbeing of the nation. **Sarah Derbyshire MBE**, Chief Executive, Orchestras Live and **Matthew Swann**, Chief Executive, City of London Sinfonia, will chair a specialist panel bringing together leading

funders and healthcare professionals. Delegates will have the opportunity to pose questions in advance on "How orchestras can integrate the development of musicians' creative engagement skills into work with health and social care settings and 'Navigating health and social care networks to establish relationships that expand orchestras' role as service providers and generate earned income".
